Luckily, we live in an area with many independent businesses and shops. Listed below are ten good reasons why we should support our local businesses this Christmas.

- **1. It's less stressful to shop locally!** Shopping locally is much nicer than battling the Christmas crowds at a large shopping complex. Shopping locally removes the stress of city one-way systems, the car park queues and playing human dodgems, it also removes the pressure of waiting for that it-should have-arrived-two-days-ago gift ordered online!
- 2. Your spending will boost the local economy. Research on spending by local authorities shows that for every dollar spent with a small or medium-sized business 60% stayed in the local economy, compared to 40% with a larger business. Small businesses are vital for national economic recovery and growth, and are leading the way in innovation and new job creation. They serve the needs of the local economy and many provide services to larger businesses, helping your local community and beyond!

By spending money with local businesses, you are paying a friend or neighbor's salary. Small Businesses integrate into the local community and tailor their services and products accordingly; therefore, it is unlikely that a small business is going to move to a different city or country, therefore keeping jobs in your community.

If you're struggling to find that unique gift, the chances are that the shop assistant can go above and beyond to help you make the right choice, and you can almost guarantee that no one else will have bought the same!

- **6. You're likely to get better service.** Local business owners do what they do because they are passionate about their products and typically take more time to get to know their customers. They'll often go the extra mile to help you and to ensure you're a satisfied customer.
- **7. You can get good advice.** Shopping at a local business means you're more likely get an expert opinion about the products that you're purchasing. Local business owners are well informed about their products and know what they are selling. They must be experts in their field to compete. Ask them questions and get advice about products.

From nights away on a boat, to stand up paddle boarding lessons, family photographs to dance lessons, consider giving an original gift that supports a local business.

Orange Sour Cream Rolls

Deck the halls! And batten the hatches while you're at it, the Spirit of the Christmas Present rears its head.

Lovely Norman Rockwell images burst into our vision- apple cheeked Grandmas with endless batches of cookies, cherubic children with candy canes and iconic Santas belting late night colas.

We all would love to remember happy surfeited holidays oozing good will. Reality however is always with us in the form of cranky children, kitchen disasters, and nasty weather right at shopping time.

This recipe will help-it's easy to make, infinitely adaptable and totally satisfying. The sour cream dough can be shaped as desired and many fillings can be used.

In large mixer bowl proof 1 one package yeast in 1/4 C warm water until very foamy. Melt 6 tbsps butter and set aside. Add to the yeast mix two eggs. ¹/₄ C sugar, ¹/₂ C sour cream and the cooled butter, Mix, and add one C flour and 1 tsp salt and mix again. Add 2 more cups of flour to make soft dough.

Let rise to double.

Make the filling in a small bowl by mixing 3/4 C sugar, 3/4 C packed coconut and one to two tsps grated orange rind. The rind tends to clump, so make sure it's evenly distributed.

Turn the risen dough out and divide in two. Form each into a 12-inch round circle and brush each with one tbsp melted butter. Spread half of the topping evenly over each. Cut into eight wedges and roll up like crescent rolls. Place pin-wheel style in a greased and parchment paper lined 9-inch round pan. Let rise again.

While the dough is rising make the topping and let cool. Combine in a saucepan, ½ C sugar, ½ C sour cream, ¹/₄ C butter and ¹/₄ C orange juice. Bring to a boil and cook three minutes. Set aside to cool.

When the rolls are doubled, bake at 350 degrees for about 30 minutes or 200 degrees on an instant read thermometer. Cool on wire racks and when cool to touch, pour the topping

You can cut the rolls into 12 wedges to extend the batch and place two

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Twinkle Twinkle Little Star!

The Holiday- time travel and gathering is in full swing. The season

of sharing (germs) has begun! How will you protect yourself this winter?

Get a flu shot. People who get flu shots have some protection; even in years when the vaccine is not a perfect fit for the circulating flu virus.

Some protection is always better than none! Individuals over 65yrs of age or with chronic health conditions (i.e. diabetes, lung disease, heart disease, etc.); may also benefit from vaccines for pneumonia.

Germs can be passed through the air (someone coughing near you), or by contact with a contaminated food, surface, or person. If one sneezes/ coughs into their hand, everything they touch becomes a point of germ contact for another person. Learn to sneeze/ cough into the crook of your elbow. Did you know the flu virus can survive up to 24 hours on a hard surface? The Noro virus, which causes vomiting and diarrhea, is viable for up to 7 days on surfaces! Maintain some distance from people who are obviously sick. Keep hands away from your nose, mouth and eyes, to avoid introducing germs from

contaminated surfaces. Wash hands often, and always before eating or

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preparing food.

A study conducted by Michigan State Univ. revealed that only 5% of the US population washes their hands properly (if at all!). Remember that statistic when you

are in a public restroom. It is pointless to wash your hands, then touch any surface/door handle on your way out! Why do 95% of Americans fail the hygiene test? They do not wash long enough. It is important to lather up and scrub all surfaces (even under nails) for a least 20 seconds before rinsing. to effectively remove germs. Twenty seconds is about the amount of time it takes to sing "Twinkle, twinkle little star" or the "ABC" song. Note: one need not sing out loud.

Are You Poisoning Your Kids?

How many of you have felt uneasy over the amount of "diet" soft drinks your children are consuming each

day? If your intuition has given you internal warnings, you are correct. As a chiropractor with a Fellowship in Pediatrics and involved with teaching internationally, I

am very concerned with the increasing use of artificial sweeteners, especially by children. The most widely used of these is ASPARTAME, marketed as "NutraSweet", "Equal", and "Spoonful". At a recent World Environmental Conference, the EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) announced that there was an increasing epidemic of Multiple Sclerosis and Systemic Lupus, among others, caused by a then unknown toxin. It was soon discovered that the toxin in question was Aspartame.

When the temperature of Aspartame exceeds 86 degrees F., the wood alcohol (methanol) in Aspartame converts to formaldehyde and then to formic acid which then causes metabolic acidosis. If you think this is not a problem, think again. Body temperature hovers around 98.6 degrees, perfect conditions

for aspartame to be converted to formaldehyde. This then affects the retina of the eye; not a pleasant

> side effect. Formaldehyde is grouped in the same drug class as cyanide and arsenic - deadly poisons. It is also used to embalm corpses and as a preservative in vaccines. It has no business being in

your child.

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Aspartame changes the brain's chemistry and has been responsible for many neurological problems such as seizures, manic depression, rage, violence, etc. This methanol toxicity mimics Multiple Sclerosis; thus people were being diagnosed with MS in error.

In the case of Systemic Lupus, it is becoming rampant especially among Diet Coke and Diet Pepsi drinkers. It is triggered by Aspartame. With continued use, it can be life threatening. When kids get off Aspartame, those with Systemic Lupus usually become asymptomatic but the disease cannot be reversed. Those diagnosed with MS (when in reality the disease is methanol toxicity), have noticed most of their symptoms



Because of its eco-friendliness, propane is a very popular choice among outdoor enthusiasts for its ease of transport and storage. Propane installers and service providers are licensed by the state and undergo rigorous training.

disappear.

Turn the Clock Back On Your Smile

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Did you know that your smile can be one of the first indicators of your age? Age expectancy continues to

increase, along with dental technologies; your smile can remain beautiful for years to come. If you want to appear younger, more healthy and vibrant: start with your smile!

As you age your lower front

teeth tend to shift forward with each birthday. This can be minimized with the right dental solution. Missing teeth create the appearance of hollowness in the cheeks. You need strong gums to support your teeth. Periodontal disease, characterized by receding gums, wobbly teeth and deteriorating jaw bone, is the primary cause of tooth loss among older adults. Fortunately, gum disease is treatable at any age with a combination of advanced deep cleaning and antibiotics. In progressive cases, surgery may be required. The American Dental Association (ADA) found that bacteria in the mouth can create gum disease conditions in only 24 hours; regular, professional cleanings are essential.

Clean, white teeth are the least expensive way to improve your looks with a "mini-facelift". Along with

daily brushing and flossing, you might consider a whitening treatment. Dental bleaches containing peroxide (available over the counter or through your dentist) will lighten your teeth a few

shades, although the results are less dramatic in older teeth. Whitening toothpastes and rinses will temporarily lift superficial stains, but don't expect the effect to last. Before deciding on a bleaching method, it's a good idea to talk to your dentist.

When visiting your dentist, remember to tell the staff if you're taking any new medications. Let the team know if you have changed dosage or frequency in medications used on a long-term basis. Your medical history is important because some drugs can cause dry mouth, resulting in tooth decay or disease.



has your heart and passion on paper. God bless you as you take a step in the direction of becoming an author that makes a difference for Christ.


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Retaining Your Best Employees – Why Should You Care?

Receiving panicked calls from employers when one or more of their key staff members have given their notice is

not uncommon. The amount of work for a single position, until the vacancy is filled, can be staggering for a small workforce.

- Cost of onboarding new employee, including training and management
- Lost productivity—it may take a new employee one to two years to reach the productivity of an existing person.
- Lost engagement—other employees

example new employees take longer and are often less adept at solving problems.

• Training cost—for example, over two to three years, a business likely invests 10 to 20 percent of an employee's salary or


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Crazy Hobbies I Never Do

At my house, however (and I suspect a good many people have a similar collection), is a shelf of cool books that I absolutely know I will never use, including:

- How to Carve Totem Poles
- Make Your Own Electric Guitar
- Making Rocking Horses
- Teacher's Guide to Pendulums
- Thatch (yes, for thatched roofs)
- Techniques of Safe & Vault Manipulation
- How to Build Unicycles
- · ...and so on

Let's get one thing straight--I know I'm never going to thatch the roof of my house, and I'll probably never even thatch the roof of my little garden shed.

However, I keep the book as a sort of concrete daydream—thatching is definitely beyond my daily skill set, but it seems like something I could do. Reading about it (or carving

rocking horses, picking locks, etc.) not only pushes the boundaries of what I know how to do, but also lets me fantasize a little about grand schemes that will never come to pass, but that are still fun

Urinary Tract Obstruction in the Male Cat

Both male and female cats can have periodic episodes of lower urinary tract disease. Signs of lower urinary tract disease are similar in both male and female cats and include; excessive grooming of the genitals, increased frequency of urination and in smaller volumes, straining to urinate, peeing outside the box, and sometimes blood tinged urine. The symptoms are the same regardless of the underlying cause.

Causes can include urinary crystals and or bladder stones, urinary tract infection and anatomical abnormalities. The most common cause of lower urinary tract disease symptoms in cats is the result of a condition known as idiopathic cystitis. Urinary tract infections rarely occur in cats between the ages of one and twelve years of age. Urinary crystals and bladder stones are slightly more common and can often be addressed through dietary modification. Anatomical abnormalities are extremely rare. Nearly two thirds of cats with episodes of urinary disease are due to idiopathic cystitis. This is a condition we don't yet completely understand and will be the subject of a future article. The point is that males have much narrower urethras than

females and they can get plugged up if during episodes of lower urinary tract disease.

Plugs are formed from combinations of blood, crystals and mucous. The most common location for a plug to get lodged is at the very end of the urethra which is at the tip of their penis. Once the plug is lodged the male cat has officially become blocked and his urine has nowhere to go. The bladder simply gets bigger and bigger. This is an extremely painful situation. If a male cat shows the above symptoms and becomes extremely painful, squats for long periods while producing little to no urine, and howls whenever his abdomen is touched then he needs to be seen by a vet immediately. The sooner they are unblocked the quicker they recover. If the condition persists they become increasingly lethargic while remaining extremely uncomfortable. The cardiovascular system begins to shut down and their body temperature drops as potassium that normally is excreted in the urine backs up into the blood. High levels of blood potassium can ultimately cause the heart to stop beating entirely.

So, the sooner they are un-blocked the less time they must spend at the veterinary clinic recovering. Early intervention is key.

Savior surrounded by farm animals. Undoubtedly it was a dirty, smelly, humble beginning - especially when compared to the power of Easter!


