## **Ramblings From the Kitchen** of Karen Rogers

Poor little Upside-down Cake, cares you've got and woe,

Because, little Upside-down Cake, you're not sure how you go!

Sad little Upside-down Cake, your worries never stop,

Are you standing on your bottom or sitting on your top?

Where do you go today to find deepseated, soul-satisfying comfort? Why to food, of course! Comfort Food is the most perfect descriptive phrase for the thing that brings fond memories, soothes your taste buds and feeds the very soul.

A quest for the quintessential comfort food, Pineapple Upside-down Cake is in order. Where do you find it? Nowhere!! Name one restaurant, bakery or supermarket where you can tie into a decent piece of old fashioned, Grandma approved PUS-DC.

However, it is a piece of cake to make it in your own kitchen. I use a 9X13 inch Pyrex pan, but any other type pan will work well. Spray your pan with non-stick spray and line it with parchment paper cut to fit the bottom only. This is important because it will keep the good stuff from sticking to the pan. Drain two 20-ounce cans of sliced pineapple. Melt 1/3C butter and set aside. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees (325 for Pyrex pans). Sprinkle 3/4C packed brown sugar evenly over the parchment paper and drizzle the butter

evenly over the sugar. Evenly space the pineapple over the sugar-use whole rings for large servings and cut the rings in half to extend the batch for smaller servings. You will have pineapple left over. Place a maraschino cherry in each pineapple center. Set aside and prepare the batter.

In a large mixer bowl beat 1/2C room temperature butter or shortening with

1 1/2C sugar about five minutes or until it becomes very light and fluffy, scraping the bowl at least three times. Add two eggs, one at a time, beating well each time. Scrape down bowl and add 1 tsp salt, 2 ½ tsp baking powder and 2 tsp vanilla, and mix well. Scrape the bowl and add 2C flour, sifted, alternately with 1 1/2C milk, scraping and beating for about one minute. Pour the batter evenly over the prepared pan and bake about 45 minutes or until done in the center, 200 degrees on a thermometer.

Set on rack and let cool for at least thirty minutes. Loosen the sides of the cake from the pan with a knife and place a large platter or baking sheet over the cake and turn it over. Carefully lift off the parchment paper. Serve warm or cold.

A note from Rick: This MUST be served with whipped cream. NOT "topping" or stuff from aerosol cans. Real heavy cream beaten stiff with powdered sugar or Splenda for sweetening.

So, dig in and enjoy! What doesn't go to the coronary arteries will migrate directly to the hips, but your taste buds will be happy. Comfort rules!

# The Perfect Valentine's Day Gift!

February is American Heart Month. Heart disease is responsible for one in four deaths in the U.S.; making

it the leading cause of death for both men and women. Given this profound statistic, it is reasonable to assume one will be present during a cardiac event at some point in life. Whether as

the victim, or as a bystander; will you know what to do?

A CPR (cardio-pulmonary resuscitation) class makes a heartfelt Valentine's Day gift. Classes offered by the American Red Cross or the American Heart Association are reasonably priced and only take a few hours to complete.

Heart attack symptoms can include: chest pain that may radiate to the neck, jaw, or arms, shortness of breath, extreme weakness, lightheadedness, loss of consciousness, nausea or vomiting, "cold" sweats, and a rapid or

irregular heartbeat. If you or someone in your proximity is experiencing chest discomfort in combination with any other symptom listed for more than five minutes, call 911. Time is of the essence; waiting to "see if things

improve" is unwise.

February is National Children's Dental Health Month! From infancy to adolescence, your child's smile will

be the brightest with healthy habits.

#### **INFANCY**

When should I start cleaning my baby's teeth? Start cleaning your baby's mouth as soon your child is born. Before your baby's teeth begin to emerge,

clean the gums by lying him in your lap and gently rubbing a piece of gauze or damp washcloth along the baby's upper and lower gums. When the primary teeth begin to peek through, use a toothbrush specially designed for a baby's mouth. Toothpaste really isn't necessary; but if you do, use a "starter" toothpaste that does not contain fluoride.

#### TODDLERS/CHILDREN

When should I start using fluoride toothpaste for my child? If your child can spit, start using toothpaste. Fluoride is safe and necessary for keeping teeth strong, but only at appropriate levels. The American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry recommends using fluoride

by age 3. Apply a pea-sized amount of toothpaste on the brush. Younger children may accidentally swallow

toothpaste in excessive amounts, which can actually discolor their teeth. Remember, even if your water is fluoridated, you still should use a fluoride toothpaste.

#### ADOLESCENCE/ **TEENAGERS**

My child plays sports. Does he need a mouth guard? Yes! Mouth guards are absolutely necessary when playing sports. The appliance usually covers the upper teeth and protects your child from broken teeth, cut lips, and other oral damage. If your child wears braces or other fixed appliances, like a bridge, we may recommend a guard for the lower teeth as well. Ask our team about customized mouth guards.



# **Protecting Propane Tanks** in The Winter

Winter is here, this means winterizing your different outdoor appliances, bringing plants inside and preparing for the freezing

preparing for the freezing temperatures. When propane is exposed to extreme heat and extreme cold the pressure in your tank gets higher with heat and lower with cold.

Propage tanks can

Propane tanks can freeze up while in use. Usually it is a sign the regulator is feeding the propane too quickly, or there is a high level

of humidity. It may be alarming to notice the tank is freezing up, but it is not dangerous. However, it can leave you without propane until the tank is unfrozen. In very cold conditions, there may not be enough vapor pressure in your tank to keep your system/appliance working properly. The colder it is outside, the lower the pressure will be in your tank.

#### HERE ARE SOME WAYS YOU CAN AVOID PRESSURE ISSUES WITH YOUR PROPANE TANKS IN THE COLD

- Keep your tank full by filling it up when it gets to 20% full.
- Never attempt to cover up your

tank. This will merely insulate the propane inside the tank from the natural heat of the daytime sun,

possibly making the problem worse

 For the same reason, don't let snow build up on your tank because it will keep it colder than the outside
 temperature.

> Never use an open flame or electrical device in the vicinity of a propane tank. Accidents involving "heating" a tank to boost

pressure are not uncommon.

If you have done a vehicle conversion on your car or truck you might notice in the winter that there is no warm up time or trying to get diesel or gas engines to start in freezing temperatures. Propane powered engines are able to warm up quickly and start every time. Propane prices won't spike in the winter when you purchase through CoEnergy's pre-buy program.

# Are Essential Oils Good for Your Fur Family?

We recently received a call from someone asking if it's true that essential oils are poisonous to cats.

It turns out that some essential oils are in fact poisonous to cats and dogs. The reason for this is that dogs and cats are lacking in liver enzymes that metabolize and inactivate toxins found in these oils.

Eucalyptus oil is particularly poisonous. According to the ASPCA symptoms include difficulty breathing, uncoordinated gait, drooling, muscle tremors, pawing at the face and mouth, burns on the lips, gums, tongue and skin. Other essential oils that are potentially toxic to cats include the citrus oils, basil, cassia, cinnamon, clove, fennel, oregano, melaleuca (tea tree), peppermint, thyme and wintergreen oils.

These oils should never be applied topically or orally to a cat. Diffusors should be used with caution and not be located in rooms where cats eat their food. If you have recently handled these oils it is a good idea to thoroughly wash your hands before snuggling with your kitty just to be safe.












# Birth Trauma - Part I

This is a very disturbing topic and one which most parents are very unfamiliar with. Traumatic Birth

Syndrome (TBS) estimated to be the 6th leading cause of infant death, is mostly under reported and misdiagnosed. Birth is a very normal biological process. It does not require



to an infant.

My concern, when dealing with pregnancy, is the status of mom=s spine and nervous system so that she can maintain a healthy pregnancy, have a good, uneventful delivery, and have a healthy baby. Briefly; often Vertebral Subluxations affect the mother's spine, changing the physiology of pregnancy, and affecting the baby in-utero. How, you ask? An interference in the function of mom's

baby's nutrition and hence growth. These factors can lead to what is called In-Utero Constraint. A situation where, in the last trimester of pregnancy, the baby is trapped in a precarious position from which it is

unable to free itself. This can lead to serious consequences during birth. I feel very strongly that all pregnant moms should have a check-up with a pediatrics chiropractor to help them and their babies through pregnancy and delivery.

I have mentioned Alcohol consumption by mom and its effect on the development of the baby's nervous system in a previous column. I did not mention smoking. Although a pregnant mom may not smoke, she and her baby may be exposed to the toxic effects of second-hand smoke at work, home, etc. The fetus can be the receiver of second hand smoke and evidence suggests low birth weight, as well as body malformations can be the result.


Currently the Middle School SET (Saint Edward Teens) is going through the Alpha Youth Film Series and the High School is going through the YOU Series and current events topics.

Through news and social media channels today we are constantly hearing of new harassment allegations in

and out of the workplace. Proactive employers are realizing they need to look for better ways to prevent sexual harassment in the workplace. Employers must ensure their employees know that any and all reports will be addressed and harassment of any kind will not be tolerated. Training is a preventative step that should be considered, but accountability is an absolute requirement.

Employers should be aware that funding for wage and hour investigations and enforcement actions has been increased to address all violations in our workplaces.

Oregon has a salary history ban in effect. This law prohibits employers from inquiring about a candidate's current or previous wages or salary. This is intended to decrease pay disparity.

food service, and hospitality. This law requires employers to provide advance notice on schedules and limit the conditions in which an employer can make last-minute changes to the schedule.

- Beginning on Jan. 1, 2018, the standard mileage rates for the use of a car (also vans, pickups or panel trucks) will be:
- 54.5 cents for every mile of business travel driven, up 1 cent from the rate
- 18 cents per mile driven for medical or moving purposes, up 1 cent from the rate for 2017.
- 14 cents per mile driven in service of charitable organizations.

Taxpayers always have the option of calculating the actual costs of using their vehicle rather than using the standard mileage rates.

Payroll and employment laws are complex and when you are cited for being out of compliance, the penalties can be significant. Be sure you have the right information to stay in compliance.



Your home is on the market. You have been juggling the calls from

There will be things like earnest money, financing provisions, inspections timelines and closing dates. In many cases a person buying

a home may be selling a home to be able to afford the purchase of your home. There are different types of

lending that vary from a cash offer to low down FHA loans, what is what and how those different scenarios benefit or hinder you being able to sell in a timely

manner are things to consider.


You are able to come to an agreement with what you feel is a reasonable deal for you. The state of Oregon requires seller to disclose certain items about the home as part of the sales process. You will need to work through that with the agent to verify you do not leave yourself open to possible liability down the road. Now the buyer has scheduled a home inspection and that will be happening within the first week or so of that acceptance. The home inspector will be evaluating the overall condition of the home. French doors bring in natural light and provide a functional and traditional elegance to any home.

doors there are a few things to consider.

French doors have two panels that either swing in or swing out.

The arrangement of your furniture and the layout of your room will play a large role in determining which style works best. If you have chairs or sofas in the path of travel, then an outswing door would be

a better choice. However, both doors don't have to open at the same time. A door with a fixed panel on one side will still provide the traditional look of a French door and may allow the door to swing in.

In the past, exterior French doors were notoriously poor when it came to weatherization and security.

However, today's newer doors have multiple areas of weatherstripping and usually come with

> insulated glass, so they are as energy efficient as a sliding patio door. Keep in mind, unless you have an awning or significant overhang, inswing doors have the potential to

bring moisture into the home when opened during rainy weather. And, for security, most doors come with a "three-point lock" with rods that

> penetrate the head and sill as well as a deadbolt that locks both panels together. For warmer days screens are available that mount to the jambs and pull out like a mini blind.

You can open the doors and keep the bugs away!

So, if you have a deck or garden area you love to visit on warm mornings or you need a spacious entry for parties, or if you simply want to create a quiet interior space for reading or study, French doors may be for you.

This past Christmas, I spent a week at my brother's house in Colorado. Vacations usually mean more time to

read, so I grabbed a few books. I had a few lying around in my "to be read" stacks, so I picked three: The Crane Wife by Patrick Ness, Night at the Circus by Angela Carter, and Someone Comes to Town, Someone Leaves Town by Cory

Doctorow. All three were in my house for different reasons, but here's the strange thing—all three are about women who are birds (sort of.)

Patrick Ness is the author of the popular teen trilogy *Chaos Walking*—cool kid alert: this will be released as a film in 2019, so get started reading now! His book *The Crane Wife* is a reworking of the classic Japanese folktale. I read this because my daughter was telling me to read *Chaos Walking*—rather than read three teen books, I figured reading one adult book would be a little more interesting (and less time consuming.) As it turns out, Ness can write!

His writing varies between a sort of magical realism, some fantasy, and utter rejection of that fantasy. The story centers around the relationship between a middle-aged man and his new girlfriend who mysteriously appears the day after he removes an arrow from a crane's wing. However, the most interesting elements of the story do not come from their relationship, but rather from his daughter,

who is in her twenties and having a rough time fitting in. The book is a little weird, but overall an interesting read.

Angela Carter is one of those authors who's been on my "to-be-read list" forever. I knew I

should read her, but never got around to doing so. Her book *Nights at the Circus* is about a trapeze artist who is famous throughout the world for her swan wings—are they real or fake? Does it matter? One of the great things about this book is the opening scene, where she is being interviewed by the reporter (who subsequently falls in love with her.) One might think that a trapeze artist with swan wings would be portrayed as a graceful, elegant woman...but Carter doesn't go that route!

Unfortunately, I ran out of time during my vacation and didn't get a chance to start Cory Doctorow's birdwoman book. Doctorow is a big name in "literary science fiction" and I'll get to it eventually.

I'm not sure what the connection is between women and birds. It's an ancient relation, of course, from old myths like the crane wife, but it apparently remains relevant to a variety of modern authors. Birth Trauma continued from page 6

the-counter medications and do not question their safety. The feeling seems to be that if it is not prescribed then it is "safe". Let me be emphatic here. **All drugs affect your baby!** Most effects have not been researched yet. The safety of prescribed medications on the fetus has not been researched but it is well documented that in the adult population, properly prescribed medications are the **fourth leading cause of preventable death!** 

Another concern is the use of routine procedures which can be life-threatening for the unborn child. **Amniocentesis** and **Chorionic Villi Sampling** for example, can lead to spontaneous fetal abortion in 0.5-1.5% of cases. Be careful out there!
