

Colorectal cancer is one of the most common forms of cancer among US men and women. The American

Cancer Society estimates there will be over 140,000 new cases diagnosed in 2019.

The risk of colorectal cancer increases with age: most cases occur in people over the age of fifty.

Additional contributing factors are lifestyle related: alcohol consumption, smoking, obesity, lack of physical activity, and a high fat/low fiber (fruits and vegetables) diet.

Colorectal cancer warning signs may include: a change in bowel habits (constipation/diarrhea), pencil-thin stools, very dark or bloody stools, abdominal pain or bloating, feeling you need to have a BM that is not relieved by doing so, fatigue, and unexplained weight loss.

There are a variety of screening methods. The colonoscopy is one of the most reliable. A colonoscopy is a

procedure, performed under general anesthesia, whereby a flexible tube is inserted into the rectum, and passed through the lower intestine. A tiny camera mounted on the tube records images of the inside of the intestine. Colonoscopies are painless and take about an hour to complete. Up to sixty per cent of colorectal cancer deaths could be prevented if people followed their providers recommended screening schedule!

Grilling Cylinder Safety

Read and follow all the grill manufacturer's instructions before turning on and lighting the grill. Keep

the top open when lighting a propane grill, and don't close it until you are sure the grill is lit. Turn off the burner control and close the cylinder valve. When a grill is not in use for extended periods of time, CoEnergy cover disconnected hoseend fittings with plastic Propane bags or protective caps to keep them clean.

Properly transport and 541-738-6733 store gas cylinders. When www.coenergy.net refilling or replacing a propane cylinder, transport in a secure, upright (vertical) position in a well-ventilated area in your vehicle, and take it home immediately. Always use or store cylinders in a secure and upright position outdoors (not in a garage or shed).

DO'S AND DON'TS OF PROPANE CYLINDER SAFETY

Do

- Follow the grill manufacturer's instructions and keep written materials handy.
- If the igniter no longer works, replace it in accordance with the grill manufacturer's instructions.
- Keep the top of the grill open until you are sure it is lit, even if you have

an electronic ignition.

 Cover disconnected hose-end fittings with plastic bags or protective caps to

keep a grill clean when it is not

- Store propane cylinders outdoors in an upright (vertical)
 - · If you smell gas, and it is safe to do so, turn off the cylinder valve, turning it to the right (clockwise). If you are unable to turn off the valve, immediately leave the area and dial 911 or call your local fire department. Before you use the grill again, have a

qualified service technician inspect your grill and cylinder.

Consult a qualified service technician if you are having grill or propane cylinder problems.

- Allow children to tamper with the cylinder or grill.





KAREN'S FAMOUS RECIPES Biscuits

BY KAREN ROGERS

This is a subject near and dear to my heart—biscuits. I pity the po' fool that has only eaten ones that come from a tube!

A real biscuit must be strong enough to stand up to sausage gravy and strawberries in a shortcake, and yet be tender, melting with butter at tea parties. They can also be savory with additions of cheese, bacon, chives, etc. Or sweet with dried or fresh fruit and other goodies. Remember, biscuits are tender creatures and need a gentle touch.

Measure 2 ¹/₄ C flour into a bowl. Add 1 tsp salt and 2 tsp baking powder and mix well. Cut in 6 tbsp of cold butter until very well blended. At this point, you can add 1 C of grated cheddar and 1/4 C of fine parmesan for cheese biscuits or 4-5 strips of crumbled crisp bacon. Stir it up!

In a glass measuring cup put 2/3 C of milk and break one egg into it and stir with a fork until well beaten. Make a well in the dry ingredients and pour the liquid in. Stir quickly with a fork until the dough comes together, then turn out on the counter and knead gently four or five times.



Pat the dough out (do not roll it!) to about 3/4 of an inch thick and cut into biscuits. Bake at 400 degrees until well browned, about 15 minutes.

If you are making chive or other fresh herb biscuits; add them to the milk mixture, they will blend in better than when mixed with the dry.

To make easy drop biscuits and skip the rolling and cutting, simply increase the milk to 1 cup. For the nicest shape, use a levered scoop that will measure 1/4 C of batter; or a tablespoon.

Out of the oven, slather them with butter, while hot and inhale them. They do freeze well and 30 seconds in the microwave refreshes them so they can make a quick treat at breakfast. Break out the grape jelly!



Essential Oils and Pets

A question recently came up regarding whether essential oils are toxic to pets.

It turns out that some essential oils are in fact poisonous to cats and dogs. The reason for this is that dogs and cats are lacking in liver enzymes that metabolize and inactivate toxins found in these oils.

Eucalyptus oil is particularly poisonous. According to the ASPCA symptoms include difficulty breathing, uncoordinated gait, drooling, muscle tremors, pawing at the face and mouth, burns on the lips, gums, tongue and skin. Other essential oils that are potentially toxic to cats include the citrus oils, basil, cassia, cinnamon, clove, fennel, oregano, melaleuca (tea tree), peppermint, thyme and wintergreen oils.

These oils should never be applied topically or orally to a cat. Diffusors should be used with caution and not be in rooms where cats eat their food. If you have recently handled these oils, it is a good idea to thoroughly wash your hands before snuggling with your kitty just to be safe.

The National Safety Council observes Window Safety Week during the first week of April. It

is designed to heighten awareness for parents and caregivers in order to prevent falls from windows and help them understand the role windows play in fire safety. With warmer weather ahead, here are a

few suggestions to keep your children and guests safe.

Window screens are designed to keep insects out rather than hold a child's weight and prevent them from falling. Children should not be left unattended around open windows with or without window screens. Avoid placing furniture under windows that might allow a child to climb and potentially fall from an open window. You might consider purchasing window opening control devices from the manufacturer which are designed to limit how far a window can open but have a release to allow for escape in case of emergency. Finally, planting shrubs or grass beneath a window will lessen the impact if a fall does occur.

If you have wood windows, make sure they are not painted shut. While doors are the primary exit during a fire, windows are considered a secondary exit. Make sure they open properly in case of an emergency and be sure to

> train your children how to escape from a window if needed. Installing window air conditioners is common however keep in mind these windows may be needed for escape in case of a fire!

Always be sure that you have at least one window in each bedroom that meets local codes for escape and rescue.

As summer approaches, it's a great idea to take a look at your upper floor windows to prevent any falls. While you're at it, consider how you might escape so you'll be prepared in case of an emergency.

I picked up this book for two reasons. First, quite a few customers have been asking for the "Gray Man"

series. Second, there's a blurb on the front cover from Lee Child (who says, "I love the Gray Man"), and I'm always looking for books to recommend to people who want something similar to Lee Child's Jack Reacher series.

The good news? This

is just as action-packed as anyone could hope for. The Gray Man, aka Court Gentry, is an ex-spy, current-tough guy who goes around saving people. That's no breakthrough character type, but he's a believable character, and he also has something of a conscience.

Think for a minute about the kind of "tough guy" often portrayed in books and movies—Travis McGee, Jack Reacher, Mitch Rapp, Dirk Pitt, even James Bond—whoever it is, these guys do some pretty bad things in the name of good: they are an end-justifies-themeans kind of crew. Some of them reflect on the morality of their actions, but usually only in a dark way. Add Court Gentry to the list, but he seems to be more concerned with doing the right thing than other, similar characters.

Gentry first needs to kidnap the Then things get a little complicated,


> and he needs to kidnap her son. Job done. Then, things get even more complicated and he needs to do some covert spying, sneaking, and killing while in Syria. You get

the drift. This is good stuff, and maybe not one hundred percent believable, but it moves fast enough that you're happy to make a few leaps of faith.

The other good news? This particular book is set around Syria. That's good for one reason—it helps the reader to understand a little bit better the very complex situation over there. There's Syrians, Free Syrian Army rebels, Russians, Iranians, ISIS, and mercenaries all mixed up, fighting each other. By putting it in a pretty straightforward plot frame, Greaney actually makes a little sense of the political situation.

The bad news? Well, this is the seventh book in the series. It's good enough that now I might need to go back and read the first six!
