
Who and what is LAFTA?

The kids are home for summer! What to do? Dirt has always been one of the kids' best toys, so home gardening could just be one fun activity for your children. 1. Choose the right plants: Kids will more likely choose plants and flowers with bright colors, so have a load of varieties of plants. Wapiti Bowmen Archery Club









The Wapiti Bowmen archery club originally started in 1949. Due to lack of facilities the club became mostly dormant from 1965 to 1970 when archers in the Lebanon area got together and essentially reformed the club. Today, the club has a 40 acre property on Richardson Gap Road near Lacomb on which the members operate club activities.

The stated goals of Wapiti Bowmen include the promotion of archery as a sport, encouraging bow hunter education, promotion of archery facilities, sponsorship of competitive archery events and cooperation with Oregon Bow Hunters, a statewide archery organization. In order to meet these goals the club hosts several outdoor archery shoots each year using both paper targets and foam 3-D animal targets. They sponsor youth shoots and hold open house events for both adults and youth. And Wapiti Bowmen work alongside groups such as scout troops

for Eagle Scout projects and educational groups encouraging young archers as they learn the sport.

The club's property is home to a target range with a covered shooting line holding targets at distances from 10 to 100 yards. This allows archers to hone their skills at a large number of distances. There are also two target 'trails' of 14 targets each. These are at a variety of distances in a wooded setting with bales covered with target faces that change with the season

While the club does not sell equipment, Wapiti Bowmen has long had a close working relationship with two local archery shops (The Archery Hut & M2 Outdoor Sports). 

KAREN'S FAMOUS RECIPES Perfect Picnic Chicken

BY KAREN ROGERS

As summer rapidly approaches, barbecue season comes to the forefront of every foodies' mind. I will state with great modesty that I am

the reigning Queen of Chicken Barbecue.

For many years the Albany Magic Club held their annual picnic at my Dad's orchard on the Santiam River in Sweet

Home. The club would buy the meat and everyone brought potluck. I am talking about a hundred plus people! We have a large barbecue set up, consisting of a fifty-gallon drum, cut in half and welded to an iron frame, set in concrete. Sturdy. No one is going to make off with it!

I cooked about 20 cut up chickenseight pieces per bird.

To make perfect BBQ, the fire is most important. I made thick lines at both sides, back and center of

each drum, leaving good sized gaps between the coals where the actual cooking is done. You do not want coals in the front to BBQ the cook!

Spray the grill top well and allow it to heat up. Carefully place the chicken

in the open areas- the ambient heat will do the work. Douse flare- ups with a spray bottle. Turn frequently, moving quick cooking pieces to cooler areas. Cook

to 185 degrees- no raw chicken for me! Check with an instant read thermometer.

Just before removing the meat, brush it heavily with BBQ sauce turn and brush again. Give it about 30 seconds to set the sauce. Brush again and remove to a platter.

In 1969, my Mom and I set out to create the perfect sauce. After a couple years we aced it, I could eat kitchen sponges covered with it. It's a secret, of course.

Dogs and the Fourth of July

As we move full swing into summer we are approaching a part of the season that many dog owners dread. The Fourth of July. There are a lot of people who have dogs that are afraid of loud noises who know exactly what I am talking about.

This is the time when our office starts getting the calls requesting tranquilizers for phobic dogs. There are some circumstances where a dog's irrational fear very well may lead to serious injury or property damage. One of our patients once broke through a sliding glass door, suffering serious lacerations, then ran out into the street and got hit by a car. When the stakes are that high we prescribe heavy medication, but in less extreme circumstances there may be some other options to consider.

One thing to realize is that just being nervous is not life-threatening, and a dog doesn't stand

much of a chance of learning to cope with the fear if given mind altering drugs. Dogs with phobias of the vacuum cleaner or other noise making appliances can often lose their fear through a process of desensitization by which they are exposed to ever increasing doses of the scary thing until they learn it is not a problem. There are actually CD's that can be purchased that allow owners to play fireworks or thunderstorm sounds

while slowly increasing the volume. Desensitization is a gradual process which takes time and patience. This process is a little harder to control when the neighbors decide to randomly unleash their illegal arsenal in the weeks leading up to the 4th of July. We can help guide our dogs by ignoring their fearful behavior by either going about our business as usual, or engaging them in active play, thus demonstrating by our own actions that there is nothing for them to worry about. Punishing anxious behavior will only make the situation worse. Even less helpful is our natural tendency to comfort our distressed pets with affection. Petting them at the wrong time will only reinforce their anxious state.

There are a variety of non-drug options that can also be used to help calm anxious dogs. Dog Appeasing Pheromone or DAP is a synthetic

version of a pheromone produced by a lactating dog that help her puppies feel relaxed and bonded to their siblings and mother.

DAP infused collars, sprays, and room diffusers may help give environmental cues that let a dog know that the situation is alright. Proquiet is a supplement with the active ingredient tryptophan, the amino acid found in turkey that makes us all sleepy

during Thanksgiving. There is also a new prescription diet made by Royal Canin called CALM that has natural ingredients like tryptophan and specific milk proteins that can bring down the tension in anxiety prone pets.



Window Cleaning Tips

Sunlight streaming through a dirty window dulls even the brightest day. However, with a little elbow grease and

the right products, you can get your windows cleaned and streak-free in no time. Here are a few tips.

On the inside of your house, start with the frame itself. The tracks where the windows slide often

collect dirt and mildew. A sponge with warm water and soap will clean them quickly and a light coat of car polish usually makes them slide more easily. For the glass, a commercial cleaner will probably work the best. Be sure to cover or remove anything on the windowsills to prevent damage from overspray. Paper towels or old cotton rags will leave lint on your newly cleaned windows. Instead, invest in a microfiber cloth or good chamois cloth. Both work well to remove the grime and prevent streaks.

Once the inside is gleaming, it's time to tackle the outside. Remove the screens and lightly spray them with a hose. Warm, soapy water works best to clean them as well. Use care not to tear the screen since fiberglass mesh fabric can get brittle with age. Wipe


the glass and window frame with a wet rag to remove encrusted dirt before using your commercial cleaner. It's

tempting to spray
the window with
the hose, but the
pressure and large
amount of water
may overwhelm the
weep system of the
windows causing
them to leak to the
inside which is why
it is better to do

this work by hand. After that, apply the commercial cleaner and wipe away with the microfiber cloth.

Second floor windows present another obstacle. Some newer windows tilt in to make cleaning easier. If your windows don't have this feature, with a little practice, you may find a sponge and squeegee on a long handle will work equally as well.

What to Read Before College (A mid-century reading list)

The Library Association of Portland produced a neat little hand-out in the pre-WWII era, encouraging young men and women to be

well-read in standard works before entering college. (It's undated, but two topical books from 1936–and lack of any WWII-related books would make me guess 1936-1938.)

The list shows two things: the timelessness of certain classics, as well as how literary & educational tastes evolve over time.

For example, by the late 1930s, **Ernest Hemingway** was very well-known, yet he's not on this list. At the time, he may have been too controversial of an author to recommend to young men and women, but to my mind his absence is the biggest surprise.

This is a little too early for John Steinbeck to be on there, and F. Scott Fitzgerald was still underappreciated at this time, despite the current assumption that *The Great Gatsby* (1926, at least a decade before this list) was one of the most important novels to be written in the 20th century! A few other authors that I'm surprised aren't on there include Henry James (would have been more popular then than now), Stephen Crane (*The Red Badge of Courage*), Mary Shelley (*Frankenstein*—it's not surprising that Bram Stoker's *Dracula* didn't make the list because it would still have been considered pulp fiction, but Shelley has

enjoyed better footing), **Virginia Woolf** (too progressive, I assume) and **Lawrence Sterne**. On a short list like this, there have to be

tough calls, of course, and some people just won't make it. I like the fact that women are decently represented (at least for this era), and that there are two books of African American interest. They've also tried to get a decent international representation here, with American, English, French,

Swedish, Russian, Norwegian, Spanish, Polish, Japanese, and Argentine authors; and a few more cultures are included through biography and history titles. I'm a little surprised that **Plutarch** is the only ancient Greek author on here; and perhaps the 1930s was not quite yet the time to include important works from non-Western ancient cultures.

It's also interesting how long the "Biographies" section is, at least in comparison to current reading trends. Science and history get just a smattering of books under "Miscellaneous," poetry is not included yet there is a healthy selection of plays, and philosophy is only touched upon by Duran't excellent Story of Philosophy.
