Albany Farmers' Market Opens!

Get ready for local, fresh produce and fun as the Albany Farmers' Market opens Saturday, April 17 in historic downtown Albany.

Hours for the Albany market will be 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturdays through Nov. 24 and will set up in its usual spot at Fourth Avenue and Ellsworth Street, next to Albany City Hall.

Covid restrictions have eased since last year, but Albany Farmers' Market organizers are asking patrons to continue exercising safe distancing and to please wear a mask. They are also asking patrons to observe these protocols:

- Stay at home if you are not feeling well
- Consider ordering and prepaying for items
- Send one person per household
- Bring cash when possible
- Use hand washing stations at the market
- Comply with rules and methods at each booth
- Don't eat while at the market
- Purchase items and then promptly exit

The market will continue its partnership with Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) redemptions, and will match the first \$10 of every SNAP purchase with Double Up Food Bucks.

"We are thrilled to be able to give people access to high quality food, at a time when household finances are strained yet everyone needs to do everything possible to protect their health," said Rebecca Landis, Marketing Director for the Albany Farmers' Market.

As of this writing, Landis said she wasn't sure how the popular Power of Produce program (PoP) was going to be handled, and that the beginning and ending dates had not yet been settled. Traditionally under the program, kids ages 5 to 12 are given tokens to shop for their own produce to learn how to eat more healthy foods. Last year, because of Covid restrictions, parents were asked to select produce for their children.

The Albany Farmers' Market is thought to be the oldest continuously operating open-air farmers' market in Oregon. It began on the riverfront and moved in 2007 to its current location.

Shoppers can also enjoy an afternoon at the monthly North Albany Farmers' Market, 6980 NW Highway 20, from 1 to 4 p.m. on Thursday, April 8, for a Seed & Starts Swap, and for more delicious fare on Thursday, May 6.

Started by Midway Farms to help small farms provide healthful food to local residents, owner Cynthia Kapple said the market might be offered twice monthly, or maybe even weekly, depending on the availability of produce from its vendors. Stay tuned!

Wapiti Bowmen Cinco de Arrow Target Shoot

The Wapiti Bowmen Archery Club will be hosting one of their signature 3D archery shoots. This fun event happens on May 1 & 2, 2021. Known as the Cinco de Arrow shoot, it is held each year in early May and is one of several weekend events that the club uses as fundraisers throughout the year. The targets are three-dimensional foam animals that are set up on two trails that wind through the woods and fields on the club's property near Lebanon. The trails are designed to challenge archers with shots that vary from as little as a few yards out to 75 yards and beyond. Both target archers and bow hunters will use the course to hone their skills at this fun-to-shoot event.

Wapiti Bowmen has a long history of promoting archery in the mid-valley. Their current home on Richardson's Gap Road has been the site of introductory archery programs for kids, target shoot competitions, 3D fun shoots, and bowhunter safety courses for youth and adults. The 40-acre property has two permanent 14-target field courses that take advantage of the contour of the land to give archers year-round access to fun shooting. There is also

a lighted practice range with targets between 10 yards and 100 yards, allowing archers to work on perfecting just about any shot at any time of day, regardless of the weather, as archers shoot from under a covered shooting line.

Future events include a Youth Safari on May 29, our Bonanza Safari on June 19 & 20, the Mel Schmidt Memorial shoot on August 21 & 22, and a fun Flashlight Shoot after dark on the night of October 16. For each of these, the club opens a concession stand to feed hungry archers with the likes of biscuits and gravy for breakfast, and burgers, hot dogs, and BBQ chicken for some shoots. The proceeds benefit our archery programs, fund range improvements, and purchase targets for future events. Wapiti welcomes all who are interested in archery to come on out and take a look at the available resources during the May shoot. There will be plenty of people there to answer any questions about archery and the Wapiti Bowman Archery Club.

Pop Those Seeds!

It's time to get those cannabis seeds started! Are you typically successful at getting them to pop? My beautiful daughter Kendra had a 100% success rate during her growing tenure; I hope you are equally as successful.

She found that the seeds especially liked warmth and moisture for a couple of days.

You can buy something fancy, like a seed-starting mat for the heat, or you can use the constant heat from a source such as a light bulb. You can invest in the little covered “greenhouse” or you can make one of your own. A clear cup with a closed dome lid, like the ones you get with a sundae, works nicely.

Seeds can be started in a folded wet paper towel or you can purchase the “plugs” that expand with water. The heat and moisture are the important parts; the seeds seem to pop no matter what they are in, so long as there is moisture and heat. The heat is important to keep the seed from molding. If the seeds are started in the plugs, you do not have to replant

them, so your success rate will be higher.

Soak your plugs in warm water and push seeds about 1” down. Put this in your little “incubator” and put it where it will maintain at least 70

degrees. It is warm enough when it “sweats.” This is probably the easiest way to start seedlings. You should see green in 3-4 days, but be

patient, as some take longer.

You'll want to

keep your seedlings in these surroundings until

they are 3-4” tall and have developed three sets of leaves or more. Often, seeds that shoot right up to 4” are male; you have a 50/50 chance with non-feminized seeds.

Cannabis does grow like a weed, but naturally, there are many tricks to the trade. Patients at Albany's Canna Kitchen & Research are able to check out grow books (and others) from the Lending Library. Abundant Coconut Cream Pie

Coconut cream pie is a real thing of beauty- creamy filling, coconut, whipped cream and crisp pie crust, heavenly!!!

I do not like pies that skimp on the filling, so this makes one righteous pie.

Blind bake one 9 inch pie shell from your favorite recipe (or purchase one, only as a last resort!)

Let cool on rack.

Separate 6 large eggs and place the yolks in a large bowl,

and beat lightly with a whisk, reserving the whites for another use.

Pour 4 C milk into a large glass measuring cup and add 1 tsp vanilla and 1/2 tsp coconut flavor.

In a large saucepan mix 1/2 tsp salt, 3 1/2 tbsp. cornstarch and 2 tbsp. flour. Mix until well blended. Measure 1 C sugar or Splenda, if using Splenda do not add until after the milk is added. Mix the sugar in the pan and slowly add the milk, stirring carefully so no

lumps form. If using the sweetener, add it now. Cook over medium heat until the mixture thickens and boils, stirring constantly. Remove from the heat and pour about half over the egg yolks, whisking quickly until combined and smooth. Return the yolk mix to


the sauce pan and stir for about a minute. Stir in 3/4-1 C flaked coconut and pour into the shell. Immediately press a piece of plastic wrap onto the surface

to prevent a thick "skin" from forming. Chill completely. Serve with real, sweetened whipped cream and top with toasted coconut.


By omitting the coconut and coconut flavoring, you can make a banana cream pie by placing sliced bananas in the bottom of the crust.

No thin, pitiful store-bought or frozen pie can hold a candle to this fine abundantly filled pie!

New Thoughts on Autism

WHAT IS THE NEW THINKING ABOUT THE INCREDIBLE INCREASE IN CHILD AUTISM?

In a study by Drs. Anthony Samsel and Stephanie Seneff, MIT scientists have drawn a strong correlation between glyphosphate pesticides and autism spectrum disorder. The study was published in April 2013.

Glyphosphate (commonly called Roundup) is one of the most widespread herbicides in use today. Today, most people's exposure to Roundup is not on the farm or the garden, but through eating genetically modified foods (GMOs). 80% of genetically modified crops, particularly corn, soy, canola, cotton, sugar beets, and most recently alfalfa, are specifically targeted towards the introduction of genes resistant to glyphosate, the so-called "Roundup Ready" feature." This allows commercial farmers to spray Roundup on their crops continually without killing the plants. The upside is high yield crops with no pest damage. The downside is that the crops are saturated with Roundup and consumed by those who eat the crops.

The industry asserts that glyphosate is nearly nontoxic to mammals

and therefore it is not a problem if glyphosate is ingested in food sources. It is claimed to be less toxic than aspirin. As a consequence, measurement of its presence in food is practically nonexistent. Research doesn't back up these claims.

"At today's rate, by 2025, one in two children will be autistic," Dr. Seneff stated. She noted that the side effects of autism closely mimic those of glyphosate toxicity, and presented data showing a remarkably consistent correlation between the use of Roundup on crops (and the creation of Roundup-ready GMO crop seeds) with rising rates of autism.

HOW DOES ROUNDUP AFFECT THE HUMAN BODY?

Glyphosate inhibits detoxification of xenobiotics and interferes with cytochrome P450 enzymes (enzymes that allow the liver to detoxify the body), which enhances the damaging effects of other chemical residues and toxins, and very slowly damages cellular systems in the body through inflammation. It has also been found to have a direct effect of killing normal gut bacteria leading to gut dysbiosis. Eat only organic foods and avoid all GMO products.

Which Plants are Toxic to your Fur Family?

I recently got to watch an excellent Zoom lecture for veterinarians regarding poisonous plants. Not only was it helpful for me, but I also thought it would make for a good little piece of education for pet owners.

Thankfully, most plants are not extremely toxic to pets. For example, most houseplants are only mildly toxic if ingested. This is because most houseplants are in a group known as insoluble oxalate containing plants. These are the leafy green, hard-to-kill houseplants that do well without direct sunlight. Examples include plants like philodendrons, devil's ivy, umbrella plants, mother in law's tongue, and false lilies like calla and peace lilies. (Note: true lilies are DEADLY to cats, see below) These predominately cause oral irritation and GI upset. If a cat was recently seen chewing on one of these plants and is now hyper-salivating, just rinsing out its mouth can be very helpful, along with a call to the veterinarian. A smaller group of houseplants fall into the soluble oxalate containing group. These oxalates can be absorbed and, if ingested in large enough amounts, pose a problem for kidneys. The good news is that pretty large amounts need to be ingested in order for oxalates to become toxic. One exception is the popular shamrock plant in a house with a senior cat with delicate aged kidneys. This one should be kept out of reach if your older cat likes to nibble occasionally on greens.

Now for some of the bad plants. The number one deadly plant with respect to cats are the true lilies. Veterinarians hate the spring holiday season because of the popularity of Easter lilies in flower bouquets, which are of course only kept indoors where they

can be enjoyed before they wilt and are thrown out. The true lilies are one of the most popular flowers in bouquets regardless of the time of year. They are cheap, smell nice, and even the greens are used in floral arrangements. A true lily should NEVER be in the same house as a cat. They are that deadly. True lilies include day lilies, stargazer lilies, tiger lilies, and Oriental/Asiatic lilies. Exposure to any part of the plant is toxic even the pollen. The result is acute kidney failure in a matter of hours. A recent survey showed 60% of homeowners said they could identify a lily, but only 30% knew how deadly they are to cats, so you might want to share this information with other cat owners.

Another highly poisonous plant increasing in popularity is the cycad or sago palm. These are among the plants you'll find at the last-minute purchase section at an IKEA. They are also very hardy, which is probably why they've been around since before the time of the dinosaurs. They are extremely toxic to all animals, including humans. (But people are very unlikely to eat them, unless you have toddlers around.) As for pets, it is dogs that tend to ingest these plants. Any part of the plant is toxic. The toxin in this plant does the most damage to the liver. One study of reported cases found that fifty percent of dogs that ingested a toxic dose died. So, the sago palm also gets special mention and dog owners should be aware.

There are other plants that are known to be toxic, but cases of poisoning in small animals are thankfully rarely reported. The take home is that true lilies kill cats and sago palms are potentially deadly for dogs.

Window Safety Week

Window screens are designed to keep insects out, rather than hold a child's weight and prevent them from falling. Children should not be left unattended around open windows, with or without window screens. Avoid placing furniture under windows that might allow a child to climb and potentially fall from an open window. You might consider purchasing window opening control devices from the manufacturer, which are designed to limit how far a window can open but have a release to allow for escape in case of emergency. Finally, planting shrubs or grass beneath a window will lessen the impact if a fall does occur.

If you have wood windows, make sure they are not painted shut. While doors are the primary exit during a fire, windows are considered a secondary exit. Make sure they open properly in case of an emergency and be sure to train your children how to escape from a window if needed.

Installing window air conditioners is common, however, keep in mind these windows may be needed for escape in case of a fire. Always be sure that you have at least one window in each bedroom that meets local codes for escape and rescue.

As summer weather approaches, it's a great idea to take a look at your upper floor windows to prevent any falls. While you're at it, consider how you might escape so you'll be prepared in case of an emergency.

Portable Outdoor Propane Heater and Tank Safety and Storage

The benefits of propane don't end at the front door. Portable propane patio heaters and outdoor heaters are becoming increasingly popular with certain small businesses, restaurants, and families on their backyard patios during these times with COVID regulations. Outdoor propane heaters work by different methods and emit heat by convection, forced air, or through infrared heating. They also vary in capacity, output adjustability, size, and capability to heat areas of differing square footage. No matter which model you use, these safe, effective heaters are a great way to warm up a patio or outdoor space. Below are 6 simple rules to keep you and your guests safe. Note: Always refer to your owner's manual for information specific to your model.

- **Do not operate or light the heater if you smell gas.** Propane has a distinct odor (rotten eggs), and care should be taken when changing propane cylinders and lighting the heater.
- **Outdoor Propane heaters are for outdoor use only.** Outdoor heaters may seem like a suitable replacement for indoor heat source, but they should

never be used indoors or enclosed areas.

- **Outdoor propane heaters should be turned off and disconnected prior to relocation.** Outdoor propane heaters offer the convenience of portability and mobility. Moving them while a propane outdoor heater is in use, however, could create a potentially unsafe situation.
 - Keep outdoor heaters away from exits. Regulations require that portable outdoor propane heaters "shall not be located within five feet of exits from an assembly occupancy." This is to prevent heaters from being bumped or knocked over by people entering or exiting the building.
- **Only use outdoor patio heaters on flat, stable surfaces, away from foot traffic.** Do not place heaters anywhere unstable, in high-traffic areas, or in the path to primary exits.
- **Keep heaters away from flammables.** Each manufacturer has specific requirements for how close heaters can be to combustible materials like paper, and items that might melt, like tents or plastics. Make sure that you are familiar

Good Review

The Coming Race

By Edward Bulwer-Lytton

You may have heard that post-apocalyptic fiction is one of the hottest trends in modern literature. With a worldwide pandemic making the daily news, post-apocalyptic settings have reached a wider audience than ever and crossed genres from science fiction to adventure to literary novels.

About a century and a half ago, long before post-apocalyptic writing was a “thing,” The Coming Race achieves something rarely seen--it is a PRE-apocalyptic novel. It actually has a foot in each of two separate traditions: the utopian novel, and the lost race novel.

Our hero is a young man traveling the world. He accidentally discovers that there is an entire world inside of the hollow earth. (This was not a new invention--Jules Verne’s classic Journey to the Center of the Earth was first published in 1864, and The Coming Race was published in 1871, so certainly Bulwer-Lytton read Verne’s book.) Much of the first half of the book is a description of this utopian society. Most notable to the visitor--something he

repeatedly discusses--is the astonishing fact that the women are stronger and smarter than the men.

Some of the traditional nineteenth century gender roles are simply reversed, especially those involving courtship. In general, however, the society is much more egalitarian than its contemporary America, but it seems that the author can’t imagine a truly equal society, and there are still gender issues that would make a nineteenth century male comfortable. (Especially the fact that women give up their wings when they marry.)

The basic takeaway is that this society has learned to control “Vril,” an electric super-source, and it grants them unlimited power, including the society’s ability (and moral willingness) to commit complete genocide to a race they deem inferior. The reader is left with no uncertainty of two facts: a) humans are inferior to this race, and b) the “coming race” is running out of room underground...

- Store cylinders on a firm level surface.
- Store cylinders a minimum of 10 feet away from any source of ignition such as smoking areas or air conditioning/refrigeration equipment.
- Store cylinders away from where people generally congregate.

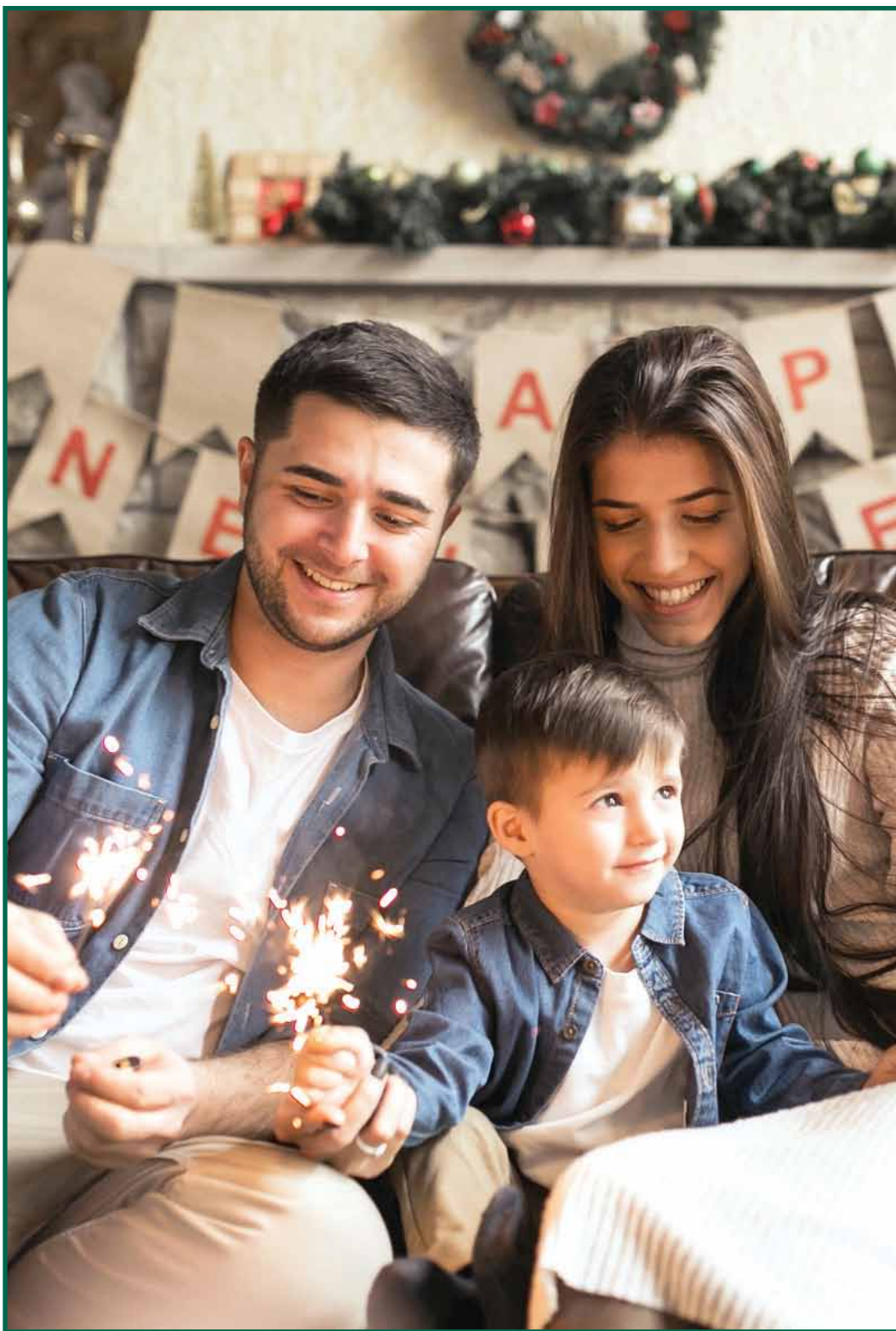
